Cultural Events

Museums

Carnegie Museums of Art and Natural History

The crown jewel of Andrew Carnegie's contribution to Pittsburgh. These two museums are connected, located just down the street from the hospital on Forbes Avenue. The art museum has a modest collection of some interesting works. The natural history museum has one of the largest collections of dinosaur bones in the world- you have to check out the T. Rex! One admission gets you into both museums, special exhibits may be extra.

Andy Warhol Museum

A museum dedicated to one of the icons of pop culture. Actually, it is the largest museum in the US featuring just one person. Located on the North Shore near the sports stadiums.

Children's Museum

Located on the city's North Side, this place is full of fun things for kids. There are plenty of arts and crafts areas, the original King Friday set from Mr. Roger's Neighborhood, plus an entire second building devoted to Sesame Street.

Senator John Heinz Pittsburgh Regional History Center

Pennsylvania's largest history museum, operated in association with the Smithsonian Institution. Uncover the myths of the Underground Railroad, experience the thrill of an unmatched sports legacy and climb aboard a 1940s Pittsburgh trolley. The History Center brings more than 250 years of Western Pennsylvania to life. Located on Smallman Street in the Strip.

Live Theater

Civic Light Opera is well-known for their musical theater productions which are performed at the Benedum Center in the Cultural District downtown.

Pittsburgh Broadway Series features plays and musicals currently touring the country. From classics to the hottest new shows straight from Broadway, the series offers a broad appeal to all audiences. Shows at the Benedum Center and Byham Theater in the Cultural District.

Pittsburgh Public Theater a great theater company that puts on both musical theater and plays.

City Theater another smaller theater group with theater in the South Side - which terrific original small productions.

The Symphony

Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra - Widely acclaimed as one of the top symphonies in the world - perhaps in the top 3 - your stay in Pittsburgh will not be complete without at least one performance. The home of the Pittsburgh Symphony is Heinz Hall, itself a historic landmark worthy of a visit. For more information, visit www.pittsburghsymphony.org.

The Pittsburgh Zoo is located in Highland Park, a 15 minute drive from Oakland. 77 acres with 475 species! Open every day of the year except Christmas, Thanksgiving, and New Years Day. Hours - generally 9 - 5, but check the website. Check out the new baby cub exhibit. www.pittsburghzoo.org

A few more highlights.....

Monongahela/Duquesne Inclines - take the easy way up the hill from Station Square to the breathtaking views from Mount Washington of downtown Pittsburgh. A must do historic landmark!

Pittsburgh Gallery Crawl - Downtown Cultural District - Four times a year, the galleries of the cultural district stay open into the evening and welcome in free visitors. All events take place at a variety of galleries and spaces and are free and open to the public. The event is ongoing between 5:30 and 9:00 pm, and patrons may start at any location.

Phipps Conservatory - Schenley Park, Oakland. A fantastic Botanical Garden with wonderful seasonal exhibits. Awaken your senses and get lost in the gorgeous pathways (indoors and open year round.) Handy convenient activity for parents' visits!

Recycling

The City of Pittsburgh and most surrounding communities have a recycling program where recyclables are picked up every other week on trash day. You can tie up your newspapers, or place them in a paper bag, and leave them curbside. Then there are the "other" items. These items are happily referred to as "Comingles" - which must be placed together in a blue plastic bag and set at the curb for recycling collection (rinse all items). Comingles include: Clear and

colored container glass (discard all lids), all metal cans (including empty aerosol and paint cans), metal lids, aluminum foil, and formed aluminum containers, such as pie plates (must be rinsed!), plastic bottles, jugs and jars. The all-important blue plastic bags are usually given to you at the grocery stores or Walmart.

Shopping in Pittsburgh

Fresh Food

The Strip District ("the Strip"): Located adjacent to downtown on Penn Avenue and Smallman Street, this is the place to be for wholesale fish, meats, produce, groceries, and pretty much anything you can think of. Saturday mornings are alive in the Strip with open air markets, streetside vendors, fresh breads, Italian cheeses, and numerous international grocery stores. Lots of greasy spoon diners for breakfast/lunch - including DeLuca's, according to some residents to be the best breakfast in the city. At night time, the Strip brings a different crowd - with lots of great restaurants, bars, and nightclubs, too.

Waterfront

- Not really a mall per se, because there is no indoor area, but has almost everything you'll need including **Target, Lowe's, Best Buy, Barnes & Noble, and Giant Eagle**. Also has a Pier One, clothing stores, movie theater, **Dave and Buster's, Bar Louie** - Improv comedy club, Sing-Sing dueling piano bar, and many restaurants.
- Directions: Drive down Murray Avenue through Squirrel Hill until it merges with Beechwood Blvd. Continue Straight for approx 2 miles, over bridge. See Waterfront at far side of bridge. Turn right at end of bridge.

Ross Park

- Lots of very nice shopping here. There is an indoor mall with **Nordstroms, Macys, J. Crew, Limited, Gap, H&M**, etc.
- About 15 - 20 minute drive. Located in the North Hills on McKnight Road. Take 279-N almost three miles to exit #11-McKnight Road. The mall is several miles up the road.

Waterworks

- Not really a mall with no indoor area, but does have a **Wal Mart, Giant Eagle, Barnes & Noble**, a movie theater, and several other stores.
- Located just over the Highland Park Bridge in Aspinwall. (Across the river from Butler St)

Monroeville

- This is a huge shopping area along Route 22. There is an indoor mall with a **Barnes & Noble and Best Buy** located in the mall complex. There's also a **Wal Mart, Target, and Lowe's** nearby.
- Located east on 376. Take exit #57, Business Route 22. The mall will be a few miles down the road.

Robinson

- Another shopping mecca, similar to Monroeville. They have an indoor mall with all the usuals, plus an **Ikea, Home Depot, Lowe's, Target, Wal Mart, and Costco** in the area. Also lots of restaurants.
- Located west of the city. Take 376-W through the city. Go across the Fort Pitt Bridge and through the tunnels. 279-S for approx 6 miles. You will see signs to exit for Robinson Town Center. The shopping areas span both sides of the highway, so you may need to hunt around the complexes.

South Side Works

- Located on the South Side - Just across another river, this new high-end shopping area features stores like REI, Sur la Table, and many others. Also has a great movie theater, The Claddagh Irish Pub, Cheesecake Factory, and other tasty places to eat.

- Directions: Take Fifth Avenue PAST all the hospitals and follow Fifth down the hill approx .75 mile. Turn Left onto Birmingham Bridge. At end, turn Left and travel less than 10 blocks to SS Works. Note, at end of Birmingham Bridge - turn Right and you'll find numerous bars, restaurants, and a few shops.

Pennsylvania is a funny state. The sale of wine, beer and liquor is controlled by the Liquor Control Board. Translation - you have to go to a beer distributor for your Corona and a State Store for your Chardonnay and Jack Daniels. However, some bars are licensed to sell 6-packs. Oh, and by the way, at the Beer Distributors - they only sell by the case. Oh, and no one sells on Sundays - so plan ahead for your Steelers' game parties!

You can pick up the official application form at the State Police Office or any Driver's License Center (see above). You'll also need your original title to the vehicle, proof of Pennsylvania insurance, valid photo ID, and a tracing of the vehicle identification number (VIN) or the verification of the VIN by an inspection mechanic or notary at a dealership. This must be notarized upon completion (either at a notary public or at an AAA location) and mailed to the address listed on the form; it may be helpful to make copies of your old forms before you submit them. When the official registration is received, it must be taken with your vehicle for inspection at any number of locations ("State Vehicle Inspection") where your tires, turn signals, safety of the vehicle, etc. are checked for

approximately \$17. In addition there is an emissions inspection that costs \$25. Your registration stickers will then be issued.

Pennsylvania law states that anyone changing residency must get a Pennsylvania driver's license. If you still consider your family's out-of-state address as your permanent residence you don't need to worry about this. If you do need to get a PA license take your old license, your social security card, birth certificate or passport, two proofs of residency (bills, lease, etc.), and your checkbook (they don't take cash or credit) and prepare to wait in line. The ID requirements are even more stringent if you are a foreign national. The current fee for out-of-state transfer is \$26. For other locations, look on www.dmv.state.pa.us to search by zip code.

Public Transportation

Consists mostly of buses and one light rail line. No subways.

Buses

The standard one-way fare is \$2.00 for one zone. Children and the disabled pay a reduced fare. A transfer in any direction costs \$0.50 and is valid for three hours. Oakland, Squirrel Hill, Shadyside, Bloomfield, Regent Square - are all within one zone.

Pay your fare as you enter if the bus is heading toward downtown (inbound); pay as you exit if it is heading away from downtown (outbound). After 7:00 pm, the fare is always collected as you enter the bus. Current route and schedule information is available at the Port Authority website, on the buses, in the "T" stations, and at the Port Authority Service Center. Monthly passes can be purchased at CHP. (check with HR) Also at many Giant Eagle supermarkets.

The Airport - getting there.

The Pittsburgh Airport is approximately 20 - 30 minutes by car from Oakland. The extended long-term parking is about \$8/day. There is a super convenient bus to take you to the airport, the **28X**. This route has a stops right in front of Carnegie Mellon, OLD CHP, and the Primary Care Center. Takes you directly to the airport front door for \$2.60. Check out www.portauthority.org for schedules.

You cannot hail a cab in Pittsburgh. Instead, you must call the cab company and they will come pick you up. A typical fare from Oakland to Downtown is about \$10.00 and from Oakland to the airport about \$35.00.

Pets

Parks: Lots of parks have special areas called OLEAs or Off Leash Exercise Areas. These are fenced in areas where your dog can go crazy with other dogs without you worrying they will run off...not that your dog would do that. People also tend to let their dogs off the leash all over Frick, though it's technically not allowed. Just watch out for Animal Control, it can be a hefty fine. Schenley Park is a great park but there are a lot of runners so keep them on the leash.

Pet Shops: There are plenty of pet shops around so it's easy to find one, but there's always the Waterfront PetCo if you're already a PALS member. If you like to shop locally, you can go to the Pet and Plant shop on Murray Ave.

Vets: All the cool pets from Pitt Med go to Greenfield Vet. Dr. Winnie is the best and brightest Pittsburgh has to offer. Great for cats and dogs.

Fallingwater/Kentuck Knob

Two houses designed by Frank Lloyd Wright. Located southeast of the city, about an hour and a half away. Fallingwater is the most well known and often-visited. To tour this house, reservations are required. Call ahead at 724-329-8501 to make your reservations. They have various tours: standard, in-depth, sunset. Tickets for the average, one-hour tour are \$16. Hiking tours of the grounds are also offered. Kentuck Knob is a smaller, less well-known home designed by Wright located a short distance from Fallingwater. Tours here are \$12 weekdays/\$15 weekends. Reservations are recommended (724-329-1901).

Ohiopyle

Ohiopyle is a state park located near Fallingwater. It's a great place for whitewater rafting. There's also hiking, swimming, and very cool natural water slides! And to top it off there are bike trails and camping sites!

To get there, take 376 East to the PA Turnpike. Go East on the turnpike and take exit 9, D Donegal, about 34 miles from the Monroeville interchange. Turn left on Rt. 31 east. Travel about two miles, past Dairy Queen, turn right onto Rts. 711 and 381 south. Travel ten miles to Normalville (first stop sign), turn left onto Rt. 381 south for 11 miles to Ohiopyle. You'll see signs all the way.

Once you get into the town, just find somewhere to park, hop out, and smell the fresh air and hear the rush of the Youghiogheny River (that's YOK-a-gay-ny). The easiest thing to do is find the visitor's information center, which has info and maps and knowledgeable people to help you with whatever you want to do: raft, hike, rent bikes, take a dip, visit Fallingwater, camp, or stay in the hostel. Don't forget the annual Falls Race. The Youghiogheny contains a spectacular class V waterfall that is opened up once a year for competitors. Along with the action come whitewater company representatives and parties.

Moraine State Park & McConnells Mills

Two fabulous state parks, within 20 minutes of one another, located just about an hour north of the city. Moraine is noted for the 3,225-acre Lake Arthur. Swimming is offered from its large beach, which also features picnic tables and a concession stand. Lake Arthur is also heavily used for sailing and windsurfing (lessons available) and is home to many sailing races throughout the year.

Moraine also offers pavilions, cabins, charcoal grills, hiking, hunting, and fishing. A paved, seven-mile bicycle trail runs along the shoreline between the Marina Restaurant and the Bike Rental Building in the northwest corner of the park. This trail is not a loop, so it's possible to get 14 miles of biking in. There is also a 6 mile mountain biking trail loop. To get to the Moraine, take 279-N to 79-N. Take 79-N to exit 96 (Portersville/Prospect). Turn right on Rt 488. The park will start in about 3-4 miles. Follow signs. McConnells Mills has great walking/hiking trails - never overcrowded. 2,546 acres of the Slippery Rock Creek Gorge. To the Mills, Follow directions above, then LEFT on Rt 488 to Rt 19. Left onto Cheeseman Road and Right onto Kennedy Road. (about 5 miles from exit.)

Lake Erie/Presque Isle

Presque Isle State Park is located in Erie, Pennsylvania, about 2 ½ hours from Pittsburgh. There are 12 sandy beaches with lifeguards, a bike trail, and several hiking trails.

Laurel Caverns

The Laurel Caverns are located off Route 40, about an hour south of Pittsburgh. The guided tour, about 45 minutes, takes you on a loop through the beginning of the cavern. You can see many interesting natural formations, including a high narrow passage called the Hall of the Mountain King, an anti-gravity optical illusion, and a light show. An unguided tour is also available, with about a mile of passages to explore. Tickets are \$10.

Grove City Outlet Malls

For those who prefer a different kind of outdoor adventure, the Grove City Outlets provide a fun, outdoor shopping diversion. They are located just over an hour north of the city. Take 279-N to 79-N, exit 113. The outlets will be on your left, and feature stores like Gap, Polo, Ann Taylor, J Crew, and tons more.

Cedar Point

This is the amusement park of all amusement parks- affectionately known as the roller coaster capital of the world. It is located in Sandusky, Ohio, along Lake Erie- about a 3 1/2 hour drive away. All day ride passes are \$46.99. There are tons of places to stay and package deals if you want to make a whole weekend of it.

Niagara Falls

Waterfalls. Need we say more? Niagara Falls is just over a four hour drive away. Go, take a boat behind the falls, visit the casino, have dinner, a great time! Wineries along the way!

Washington, DC, is about a 4-5 hour drive away, and

Philadelphia is about a 5 hour drive. - nice weekend trips to explore a new part of the country.

A few winter highlights to look forward to.... It snows here in Pittsburgh!
