Practice/On-site Study Match Checklist Considering clinical research in your practice?

- 1. Is the research study question important to the practice?
- 2. Does this research study address a common practice issue/concern?
- 3. Does the research conflict with how the office runs? Will it conflict with the provider's regular way of practice?
- 4. Will the research study help the practice physicians improve care?
- 5. Will the research study require use of practice/office space?
- 6. Will the research study require additional time of the practice staff? (For example, will the MA/staff be asked to approach parents about the study?)
- 7. Will the research study require additional time of the physicians? (For example, will the physician be asked to consent, see the patient, perform follow-up visits, etc.?)
- 8. Will practice physicians need specific skills to conduct research study? (Specific study equipment training, cath urine, blood draw, etc.) If yes, what?
- 9. Will the research study disrupt current practice/clinical flow? (Consider amount of time spent in exam room, etc.)
- 10. Does the practice see enough patients to meet the recruitment goals of the research study?
- 11. How will the researchers keep me informed?
- 12. Who should I contact for various questions/concerns?
- 13. Will the research team communicate patient clinical information to me, and if so, how?
- 14. How will I make sure that my colleagues are informed about clinic research activities and relevant patient information on an ongoing basis?
