



JOHN G. RANGOS SR. has been a strong and consistent supporter of Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh of UPMC for more than two decades and has contributed more than \$8 million to support vital research into childhood diseases such as diabetes.

- In 1987, Mr. Rangos and the employees of his company, Chambers Development Company Incorporated, started an annual recycling campaign. The proceeds from this campaign were donated to Children's Hospital's Free Care Fund, which supports our century-old pledge that no patient be denied care because of an inability to pay.
- In 1989, Mr. Rangos launched Cruise for Kids, a one-night annual fund-raising event held aboard the Gateway Clipper Fleet's Majestic. In its first year, the event raised \$150,000 for Children's Hospital.
- Mr. Rangos has been a member of the Pittsburgh Press Old Newsboys and had the distinction of becoming the largest contributing newsboy in his first year with the campaign. The Old Newsboys were a group of businessmen who sold souvenir editions of the Pittsburgh Press and Post-Gazette throughout Pittsburgh to raise money for Children's Hospital.
- In 1989, Mr. Rangos made a gift of \$3 million to Children's Hospital to endow its new research center, and it was named in his honor.
- John G. Rangos Sr. was appointed to Children's Hospital's Board of Trustees on April 16, 1991.
- A second gift of \$3 million from Mr. Rangos in June 1999 led to the establishment of the John G. Rangos Sr. – Massimo Trucco, MD, Diabetes Research Laboratory, which is located on the fifth floor of the John G. Rangos Sr. Research Center.
- In October 2001, the Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh Foundation was established, and Mr. Rangos was appointed to its Board of Trustees.
- Mr. Rangos is a lifetime Circle of Care donor.
- The new John G. Rangos Sr. Research Center — triple the size of the current location — opens in the Fall 2008 and is located on the campus of the new Children's Hospital in Lawrenceville. The new research center will enhance the hospital's ability to recruit top researchers from around the world and serve as the hub of Children's Hospital's pediatric basic science research.
